About the Chief Executive's Report

South Dublin County Council's Chief Executive's Report is presented to elected members at Council every month and details important achievements across our various departments whilst highlighting key statistics and images from events that took place that month.

The report also highlights major news pieces and puts a focus on an area of the Council that doesn't always get the attention it deserves.

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Lower Dodder Road public consultation extension


ublic consultation on a Part 8 proposal for an active travel scheme along the Lower Dodder Road started in March and was due to end on 26 April. This project is part of the agreed Cycle South Dublin programme of works.

The scheme proposes the introduction of a new one-way system along the Lower Dodder Road and an extension to the existing footpath to provide more space for pedestrians and cyclists.

During the public consultation, there were concerns from the resident groups that people in the immediate area of the scheme were unable to meet, due to COVID

level 5 restrictions, to discuss the proposal and to fully understand its impacts on the street and the access to their homes. In response to this, and in discussion with elected members, it was agreed to extend the public consultation to 5 July to address the concerns, particularly of the elderly population living on this street.

It is now planned to bring the proposed Part 8 scheme to Council in September for consideration. Whilst this is a delay in the programme, this extended timescale will give all local people and Councillors a significantly extended opportunity to provide feedback on the proposal.



Lower Dodder Road Public consultation on the Lower Dodder Road has been extended.

Cycle South Dublin

With the easing of construction restrictions for active travel and greenway projects in April, two new Cycle South Dublin projects are now due to commence onsite during May. The first project is 650 metres long and runs on Grange Road in Rathfarnham from Nutgrove Avenue to St Enda's Drive. With three busy schools along this street, it will provide a safer environment for pedestrians and cyclists. It is planned for the works to take approximately nine months and to be completed in early 2022.

The second project is at the Jobstown Junction on the N81 in Tallaght. The project combines 500 metres of pedestrian and cycle improvements at this busy junction, along with significant landscape improvements to the surrounding green spaces. The project will take approximately nine months to deliver.

Heritage Investment

The Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage is operating the Built Heritage Investment Scheme again for 2021. The fund is intended to assist with works to safeguard structures protected under the Planning and Development Act 2000 (as amended) and, in certain cases, works to structures within Architectural Conservation Areas, and to support the employment of skilled and experienced conservation professionals and tradespeople. The allocation for the Council under the scheme for 2021 is €72,000 which was an increase of €12,000 from last year's allocation.



The Built Heritage Investment Scheme is being run again in 2021.



Draft County Development Plan

The Chief Executive's Draft County Development Plan 2022-2028 has been submitted to elected members for consideration. Consideration of the Draft Plan has to be completed within eight weeks culminating in agreement on the Draft Plan that will go out on public consultation. The Draft Plan will then go on display for ten weeks on 7 July having undergone any revisions on foot of those considerations.



Rathcoole Courthouse Plans

Plans by the Council, in partnership with Rathcoole Community Council, for an extension and alterations to the former Court of Petty Sessions on the Main Street in Rathcoole Village are currently out for public consultation.

The historic building, which is a protected structure, will be enhanced with a multi-use room, café area and significant conservation and improvement work under the proposal, with funding from both the Council and the Department of Rural and Community Development under the Town and Village Renewal Fund.

The plans can be viewed, and submissions and observations can be submitted, via the Council's online consultation portal until Tuesday 25 May 2021.

Estate Management and Tenant Involvement

s a Council, we want our estates to be enjoyable places to live and our residents to enjoy the public realm around their homes and we encourage our tenants to become more involved in our estate management work. By working together, we can provide a pleasant environment and better quality of life for everyone.

The Council's Estate Management team is available to provide advice and supports to resident groups wishing to carry out improvements in Council estates, including through creating community gardens, organising clean-ups and litter picking, and carrying out landscaping improvements and tree planting. We can also assist

with supplying cleaning equipment and materials as well as arranging waste disposal for approved initiatives in a local estate.

South Dublin County Council is strongly committed to empowering local communities to improve their areas through targeted estate management works and interventions – we will support measures to increase engagement and capacity building including through the use of technologies and innovation. Local groups are very welcome to submit information and photographs on their estate management initiatives that we will promote and share through social media and newsletters.

Week Against Racism



Local Legacies 1921/2021

outh Dublin County Council's Decade of Centenaries Programme 2021, approved by the Council's Commemorations Committee, will explore, and reflect on the impact of the pivotal events of 100 years ago at both a national and local level. The effect of the War of Independence, the Truce and the signing of the Anglo-Irish Treaty has been felt here, as elsewhere in the country, through the Civil War, and the past 100 years to today.

This year's programme will focus on local connections to the War of Independence, explored through cultural events, historical reflections, lectures, and exhibitions. We will also reflect on life at the time in a broader context, including the social conditions experienced by local people during the revolutionary period, the Irish language and cultural life, the role of women during this time, South Dublin County's military heritage, and the experiences of Irishmen who fought in the Great War on their return to their communities in South Dublin County.

We look forward to engaging with local historians, artists, community groups, and the community in general, throughout South Dublin County in the commemoration of this formative period of Irish history.

Tallaght Hospital Project As part of the Keep Well campaign,

North Clondalkin Library, and in association with with Tallaght Hospital, has been running a pilot initiative within the hospital to loan 30 playaways and 30 adult fiction books.

Tallaght Hospital has identified the William Stokes Unit, which is a ward for elderly and stroke patients predominately, as the best area to roll out the playaway audio books. These patients can have issues with their sight and motor skills and these devices enable the patients to enjoy books whilst an inpatient in the hospital.

Online resources are also being promoted within Tallaght Hospital, with particular emphasis on BorrowBox. BorrowBox is an app that allows library members borrow eBooks and eAudiobooks free from their library.

Exploring & Thinking

The four Dublin Local Authorities announced this year's recipients of the Exploring & Thinking Bursary. The Bursary Awards support individual professional artists to develop their artistic practice working with and/or producing work for early childhood arts. Early childhood arts includes a wide range of different art practices and creative experiences with/for children aged 0 to 5 years in different contexts.




The Council buys a large variety of goods, services and contracts work across a wide range of categories every year. For goods and services contracts above €25,000 and works contracts above €50.000. the Council advertises tender competitions on etenders. Suppliers can register on etenders and then register interest in particular categories to get notified of relevant tender opportunities.

The Council directly invites suppliers for quotations for contracts below €25,000 for goods and services and below €50,000 for works using the guick guote facility on etenders. To express an interest in quotation opportunities please:

The Council lit up County Hall, Tallaght, and the Civic Offices in Clondalkin on Saturday 8 May to take part in the annual Darkness Into Light mental health awareness day. Darkness Into Light is an annual fundraising day for Pieta that began in Dublin in 2009. Since Darkness Into Light began, almost €29 million has been raised for the charity.



Intergenerational Centre

The formal Part 8 public consultation process for the proposed Intergenerational Centre at Tymon Park, Wellington Lane has commenced and will be open until 5pm on 1 June 2021. The details and particulars are available on the Council's consultation portal, as are the details of how to make a submission.

The Council's capital budget made a commitment of €1.29million for the provision of this facility at Tymon Park. The proposed Intergenerational Centre with a café is designed to make the best of its parkland setting with a south facing terrace overlooking the lake. The current concept plan develops an idea of a multi-use facility that is adaptable to a variety of community uses. It is designed for the use of small to medium sized groups that require a flexible space. The proposed centre accommodates flexible use both inside and out-ide the facility and the amenities within the park are also available to the centre users.

Great response to National Spring Clean in Sputh Dublin County

pril is National Spring Clean month and South Dublin County Council is delighted to report that more than 80 groups registered to carry out clean up events in 2021.

The effort and enthusiasm of the National Spring Clean volunteers has ensured the campaign's real triumph and success.

National Spring clean is the largest, annual anti-litter initiative in Ireland. South Dublin County Council supports the initiative by providing materials, co-ordinating clean-up activities for communities in the County and organising for the

disposal of all rubbish and waste materials collected.

In addition to the materials supplied by National Spring Clean, local groups who wish to carry out local environmental enhancements, can avail of support materials through the Council's Social Credits Scheme which supports volunteers with clean up supplies, as well as materials to start up community gardens and much more.






290,000 Bulbs Planted

As part of the Council's commitment to meet the objectives set out in the Climate Change Action Plan, around 290,000 bulbs were planted throughout the County in autumn 2020 at various prominent locations and they are now blooming. Daffodil bulbs have been planted with pollinator friendly bulbs such as tulips and cammasia with around 85% of the bulb mix being pollinator friendly.

Cycle South Dublin Approved



South Dublin County Council voted to approve the Cycle South Dublin programme of work at April's Council meeting.

S outh Dublin County's population is set to grow to nearly 330,000 people by 2030. This would be an increase of nearly 50,000 people living in the County from 2016. Since 2016, traffic congestion in South Dublin County has grown by 11% on main roads and this will become ever more challenging as the population continues to grow.

South Dublin County Council's mission

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is for cycling to become a credible alternative to a private vehicle. However, to do this we believe we must deliver a well-designed, safe and well-connected walking and cycling network for people of all ages and abilities.

To this end, South Dublin County Council has prepared an ambitious programme of work, called Cycle South Dublin. This programme

Current progression of Cycle South Dublin

South Dublin County Council is already making progress on delivering the programme. The following schemes are already on-site, or are due to commence on site shortly, but had been paused due to COVID restrictions.

- The 14km Dodder Greenway,
- New streets at both Celbridge Link Street in Adamstown and Belgard North Link Street in Tallaght,
- Monastery Road,
- Grange Road and the N81 Jobstown Junction schemes.

In addition to those schemes that are on-site, the Council is also making progress on several new schemes across the County at sites like Wellington Lane, Lucan Canal Loop, Dodder Lower Road and more. reflects the increasing importance of making cycling a realistic and integral part of how people move around the County. There is currently 207km of cycle lanes across South Dublin County. In recent years, the Council has progressed eight active travel projects totalling approximately 21km of new and improved cycle lanes.


The Council approved 'Cycle South Dublin' programme includes 63 projects that would deliver approximately 260km of space for cycling and walking. This is an increase of nearly 50km from the programme that was publicly consulted on in late 2020. The projects are broken into four Council led phases and include; improvements to the existing network; and then new schemes to be progressed in the following timescales NOW (within 2 years), SOON (within 5 years) and LATER (within eight years). There would also be a fifth and separate phase of works to be delivered by the NTA via Bus Connects.

The Council has been working closely with the National Transport Authority (NTA) and the Department of Transport and the NTA has advised that they are prepared to fund the majority of projects included over the next five years This has been demonstrated in their commitment to increase the Council's active travel fund from \in 8.9m in 2020 to \leq 20.7m for 2021.

Tourism Plans For Lucan



South Dublin County Council has engaged tourism development consultancy firm CHL Consulting Company Ltd to develop a plan for Lucan.

outh Dublin County Council has engaged tourism development consultancy firm CHL Consulting Company Ltd to develop a tourism product and proposition development plan for Lucan. Lucan, as a gateway to the Liffey Valley, has been designated as a 'destination town' by Fáilte Ireland under its destination development programme.

The plan will produce a roadmap

to help the tourism and hospitality sector in Lucan and environs to attract more visitors to the town. CHL have also been tasked with developing a number of themes for Lucan reflecting the uniqueness and appeal of the area which will help to market this part of South Dublin County to visitors.



Lucan. In January 2021, South Dublin County Council appointed DHB Archi tects to design public realm enhancements in Lucan Village allocating funding of €2,000,000 for public realm improvements to the riverside and village green areas. Separately the Council is advancing plans for the development of a greenway linking the two canals via Lucan village which will further enhance its destination status. The overall objective in keeping with the County Tourism Strategy is the promotion of Lucan as a tourism destination of note within the Dublin region.

Each year, Age and Opportunity invites local authorities, arts centres, libraries, active retirement groups,


care settings, community groups and clubs, associations from every part of the country to run Bealtaine events that celebrate creativity as we age.


- encourage more older people to participate in the arts and to increase the quality and opportunities of existing participants;

outh Dublin County Council has two dedicated Sports Recreational Officers, funded by the Council, who oversee the work of the local Cricket Ireland, GAA, FAI, Basketball Ireland and Leinster Rugby Development Officers, as well as delivering community sports and physical activity programmes alongside our SDCSP team. SDCSP is one of 29 local sports partnerships established for local authority areas nationwide with financial support from Sport Ireland.

Overseen by a management committee with representatives from the Council, HSE, Public Participation Network, South Dublin Chamber, as well as various sports bodies and the schools/education sector, the SDCSP team comprises a co-ordinator, a community sports officer, a disability sport officer and an administrator as well as a temporary graduate post, with two additional appointments pending for a project manager for the Active City project and an additional community sports officer who will manage communication and evaluation.

Our objective is to promote sports development, recreational opportunities, increase physical activity levels regardless of age, background or ability, promote the importance of play and encourage healthy lifestyles. We do this by:

 Inspiring more physical activity in the community including through events and programmes,

especially those who are least active,

- maximising resources including natural and built facilities, clubs and people,
- developing sports leader skills in schools and clubs to enhance introductions and pathways to sport and physical activity, and
- supporting local organisations accessing funding and other supports.

The impact of COVID-19 meant we had to change the way we support physical activities, providing a range of new initiatives including moving our sports development programmes online, including safeguarding courses, fundamentals programmes, coach education for all levels across all sports along with inclusion workshops. Other initiatives have included the delivery of daily online activities for children with a disability, including yoga, dance and fun games, which





has been rolled out by many sports partnerships nationally, mobile tablets for Tallaght University Hospital to allow patients to engage online with physios and downloaded exercise programmes, online children's athletics classes in partnership with Athletics Ireland, age friendly online physical activity classes in partnership with Siel Bleu, supporting the Booklet of Hope initiative with information on at-home exercises for over 5,000 households of mainly older persons and other vulnerable cocooners and more.

This work has been instrumental to community and personal resilience during lockdown providing respite from difficult times and giving many people purpose to their day, as thousands of participants have engaged with the various initiatives with hugely positive feedback.

As society emerges from restrictions in the coming months, we will look to build on the connections and supports developed during lockdown to return to safe, organised outdoor activities, including our multi-sports schools programmes, the OWLS programme (Outdoor, wildlife, learning and survival), free Park Fit/ Park Yoga sessions across our fantastic parks network, glow dance activities for teens in community centres, the walking programmes for adults, and exciting new initiatives including the Dublin wide Active City project and maximising use of new and existing walkways, cycleways and facilities through partnership and collaboration.


